

A1 in Northumberland: Alnwick to Ellingham Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC)

We operate, maintain and improve England's motorways and major A roads. The A1 in Northumberland: Alnwick to Ellingham scheme is a critical part of our ongoing investment and will improve journeys between Alnwick and Ellingham which will bring benefits to the area.

We are publishing this Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC) to outline our approach to consulting with the local community for the above scheme. It provides details about how you (the local community) can take part and how feedback will be used to influence the proposed design.

To make sure we approach consultation in the very best way for the local community, we've consulted on this document with Northumberland County Council.

This document also gives you background to the scheme and how our application to build it will progress.

Under the Planning Act 2008 we are required to make an application to the Secretary of State through the Planning Inspectorate for a Development Consent Order (DCO) to build this scheme. The Planning Inspectorate will examine our application and the Secretary of State will decide if the scheme should go ahead based on the recommendation made by the Planning Inspectorate. We anticipate that our DCO application for the scheme will be submitted in November 2019. We are publishing this SoCC under section 47 (duty to consult local community) of that Act.

The best time for you to have your say to inform our final design for this scheme is now by taking part in this consultation

The scheme

The existing A1 is single carriageway north of Alnwick and is therefore a significant change in the standard of the route compared to the Alnwick bypass. There are limited safe overtaking opportunities and direct accesses to the road while the agricultural and slow-moving vehicles which use the road can cause delays when these cannot be passed safely by faster traffic.

The scheme will upgrade the A1 to dual carriageway. A summary of the main features of the proposals are:

- Dualling the existing A1 between the northern end of the Alnwick bypass at Denwick and the start of the dual carriageway at North Charlton;
- One new split-level junction that include a bridge over the A1 will be constructed at Charlton Mires; and
- Construction of a new overbridge over the A1.

We are carrying out an Environmental Impact Assessment for the scheme. The scheme is an Environmental Impact Assessment development, and therefore we are publishing a Preliminary Environmental Information Report as part of the consultation material. This gives information about the potential environmental effects of the scheme, such as the impacts of constructing a second carriageway to the existing A1, to assist well-informed responses to our consultation.

Additional information about the scheme, including detailed maps/plans and information about associated benefits, will be included in our consultation brochure. Copies of the brochure will be available at local deposit points detailed in this SoCC during the consultation period and on the scheme webpage. We provide a full list of consultation documents later in this SoCC.

Consulting with the community

We have already carried out one round of consultation in the vicinity of the scheme, where we sought your views on our proposed option for the scheme design, in November and December 2016

Consultees were asked for their views on proposed route options, which helped us to identify the alignment that the A1 dualling will follow.

We've now updated our design, following our preferred route announcement in September 2017, and would like your views on this updated design as part of our consultation

This consultation – why and when

It is important to us that our consultation will:


- Provide the opportunity for the community to give feedback on potential options
- Encourage the community to help shape our proposals to maximise local benefits and maximise any impacts
- Help local people understand the potential nature and local impact of our proposals
- Enable potential mitigation measures to be considered and, if appropriate, incorporated into the scheme design before the application is submitted
- Identify ways in which our proposals, without significant costs, support wider strategic or local objectives.

Your comments will help us achieve these objectives. We will listen to, and consider everyone's views before we submit our DCO application.

This consultation will run from **25 February 2019** until **8 April 2019**. During the consultation period, we will be consulting on the following elements of the scheme:

- Impact on landowners in the area
- Potential provision of facilities for pedestrians and cyclists
- Noise mitigation measures
- Visual screening measures
- Water management measures (e.g. detention basins)
- Details of the access tracks being provided
- Potential environmental mitigation

Working with Northumberland County Council we have developed a consultation target area for the distribution of our consultation materials. This is based on who we think will be affected by our proposed design. We'll let people living and working in this area know about our consultation by posting information in advance.



Who can take part?

Anyone who is interested in the scheme is welcome to take part. We welcome all views and will take them into account before we submit our DCO application.

How will we consult?

We will use the following methods to promote our public consultation:

The Consultation Report forms part of our application to the Planning Inspectorate.

The Planning Inspectorate will decide whether the application meets the required standards to proceed to examination. This must include their determination of whether our consultation has complied with the contents of this SoCC.

Your data, your rights

On 25 May 2018, the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) became law. The law requires Highways England to explain to you – consultees, stakeholders and customers – how your personal data will be used and stored.

Highways England adheres to the government's consultation principles, the Planning Act 2008 and the Highways Act 1980 as required, and may collect personal data to help shape development of highways schemes.

Personal data collected by the project team will be processed and retained by

Highways England and its appointed contractors until the scheme is complete. In some instances consultation responses may also be sent to the Planning Inspectorate.

Under the GDPR regulations you have the following rights:

- Right of access to the data (Subject Access Request)
- Right for the rectification of errors
- Right to erasure of personal data – this is not an absolute right under the legislation
- Right to restrict processing or to object to processing

■ Right to data portability

If, at any point, Highways England plans to process the personal data we hold for a purpose other than that for which it was originally collected, we will tell you what that other purpose is. We will do this prior to any further processing taking place and we will include any relevant additional information, including your right to object to that further processing.

You have the right to lodge a complaint with the supervisory authority, the Information Commissioners Office.
