

A47 North Tuddenham to Easton Statement of Community Consultation (SoCC)

About us

Highways England is a government-owned company responsible for operating, maintaining and improving England's motorways and major A-roads. We are undertaking billions of pounds of investment on this strategic road network.

The A47 North Tuddenham to Easton dualling scheme is part of our ongoing investment; and will improve journeys between North Tuddenham and Easton and access to Norwich.

We are publishing this *Statement of Community Consultation* (SoCC) to outline our approach to consulting with the community for this scheme. It provides details about how you can take part and how the feedback received will be used to influence our proposed design.

To make sure we approach our consultation in the very best way, we've engaged with the following local authorities (responsible for areas where the scheme will be built) on our consultation plans and this document:

- Broadland District Council
- Breckland District Council
- South Norfolk District Council
- Norfolk County Council

The draft SoCC was issued formally to those local authorities in accordance with Section 47(2) of the Planning Act 2008. We have considered the councils' comments and have now published this statement on the consultation webpage www.highwaysengland.co.uk/A47NT-E and made it available to the local community at the following Public Information Points. This document also gives you the background to the scheme and how our application to build it will progress.

Our application

We propose to make an application to the Secretary of State through the Planning Inspectorate for a Development Consent Order (DCO) under the Planning Act 2008 in order to build and operate this road scheme. The Planning Inspectorate will examine our application and the Secretary of State will decide on whether the scheme should go ahead based on a recommendation made by the Planning Inspectorate. The Planning Inspectorate and the Secretary of State will have regard to the 'National Policy Statement for National Networks' (December 2014), which identifies the Government's vision and strategic objectives for the delivery of national transport networks that meet the country's long-term needs.

We anticipate that our DCO application for the project will be submitted in November 2020. A decision by the Secretary of State whether to make an Order or not is usually made about 18 months after the application is submitted.

The best time for you to have your say to inform our final design for this scheme is now by taking part in this consultation as we will consider what you say before our application for the DCO is submitted.

The scheme

The A47 is part of the Strategic Road Network. The A47 from North Tuddenham to Easton is located to the west of Norwich and forms part of the main arterial highway route connecting Norwich and Great Yarmouth to Leicester and the Midlands via King's Lynn. The A47 North Tuddenham to Easton dualling scheme forms part of the Roads Investment Strategy (RIS) commitments - the RIS sets out sets out Highways England plans for motorways and major roads.

The preferred route for the scheme was announced in August 2017 and Option 2 was chosen. You can find out more about the options consultation and Preferred Route Announcement at: www.highwaysengland.co.uk/A47NT-E

The scheme proposals consist of the following:

- 9km of new dual carriageway, running to the south of the existing A47 at Hockering and to the north of the existing A47 at Honingham
- two new two-tier junctions where the A47 passes over the local roads at the intersections of Berry's Lane with Wood Lane (Wood Lane junction) and Blind Lane with Taverham Road (Norwich Road junction)
- removal of the existing roundabout at Easton to create a free-flowing dual carriageway
- three bridges carrying the A47 over the River Tud and the proposed Wood Lane and Norwich Road junctions
- closing the existing Church Lane / Sandy Lane connection to the A47 with new side roads providing access to Wood Lane junction
- retaining sections of the existing A47 for local road connections and new routes for walkers, cyclists and horse riders where possible, with abandoned sections to be landscaped
- constructing a new underpass for walkers and cyclists to the west of the proposed Norwich Road junction keeping north – south connectivity
- a new route for walkers and cyclists linking Honingham with St Andrews Church
- a new connection to maintain the north south route from Honingham towards Weston Green, as the proposed Wood Lane junction cuts across an existing restricted byway
- new drainage systems, including pollution control devices. These are illustrated in the *Preliminary Environmental Information Report* (PEIR)
- diversion of some utilities infrastructure such as gas mains if needed
- two new laybys on the A47 between Fox Lane and the proposed Wood Lane junctions
- a site compound, storage areas and temporary vehicle parking located within the scheme boundary when construction is taking place

The new dual carriageway aims to improve safety along this part of the A47 road: the current road is already at capacity, and there are 14 collisions a year on average. The new road section will increase capacity and so make journey times more reliable for the public and businesses.

We will use best practice mitigation measures to reduce the risk of impacts on the environment, biodiversity, and cultural heritage, and will minimise impacts on local communities during construction as much as we can.

Your comments on the positive benefits, as well as the risk of any negative impacts, will be taken into account as part of this consultation.

Preliminary Environmental Information Report

We are carrying out an Environmental Impact Assessment for the scheme. The scheme is an Environmental Impact Assessment development, and therefore we are publishing a *Preliminary Environmental Information Report* (PEIR) as part of the consultation material and we will submit a full *Environmental Statement* (ES) with the application.

Both the PEIR and the ES will give information about the potential environmental effects of the scheme and the measures proposed to reduce those effects, such as: a detailed landscape planting layout, drainage system design or mitigating changes in traffic noise by installing noise barriers, to assist well-informed responses to the consultation.

Stakeholders and the public will have the opportunity to review, discuss and provide feedback throughout the statutory consultation process, and will also be available to provide feedback via consultation response forms available at the consultation events. We have also prepared a non-technical summary of the PEIR to better enable the local community to understand the environmental effects of the scheme.

Additional information about the scheme, including detailed maps/plans and the benefits of the proposed new road, will be included in our public consultation brochure. Copies of the brochure will be available at local Public Information Points detailed in this SoCC during the consultation period and on the scheme webpage: www.highwaysengland.co.uk/A47NT-E. Consulting the community - previous consultation

We have already carried out one round of consultation on the scheme: in March-April 2017 we sought feedback on our proposed options for the scheme design.

Consultees were asked for their views on four possible new route options. Of these four options, Option 2 was most favoured. Key concerns from the public helped to influence a realignment which will lead to less impact during construction and will enable the existing road to remain for local traffic to use, as well as pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders where possible.

We've now updated our designs, following our preferred route announcement in August 2017, and would like your views on this updated design as part of our statutory consultation.

More details, including the results of the previous consultation and why we chose to progress Option 2 are included in the *Public Consultation Report* and *Preferred Route Announcement* leaflet, which are available to download from www.highwaysengland.co.uk/A47NT-E.

These documents will also be available to view for the duration of the consultation period at the local Public Information Points.

About this consultation

It is important to us that our consultation will:

- provide the opportunity for the community to give feedback on the scheme proposals
- encourage the community to help shape our proposals to maximise local benefits and minimise any impacts
- help local people understand the potential nature and local impact of our proposals
- enable potential mitigation measures to be considered and, if appropriate, incorporated into the scheme design before an application is submitted
- identify ways in which our proposals, without significant costs, support wider strategic or local objectives

Your comments will help us achieve these objectives. We are required to take into account your responses to this consultation. We will listen to, and consider everyone's views before we submit our DCO application.

The consultation will run from 26 February until 8 April 2020. During the consultation period, we will be consulting on the following particular elements of the scheme:

- the proposed junctions and side roads
- environmental assessments and potential environmental impacts
- environmental mitigation measures
- · potential provisions for walking, cycling and horse riding

Working with the Broadland District Council, Breckland District Council, South Norfolk District Council and Norfolk County Council, we have developed a community consultation target area (consultation zone) for the distribution of our post card informing the local community about the consultation. This is based on those in the local area who we think will be most affected by our proposed design and advice from the local authorities. We'll let people living or working in this area know about our consultation by posting information at the start of the consultation period.

This is a public consultation. Anyone who is interested in this scheme is welcome to take part in the consultation and give their feedback. We welcome all views and will take them into account before we submit our final road design.

This will include a description of how our application was informed by the responses received, and outline any changes made as a result of the consultation. The consultation report forms part of our application to the Planning Inspectorate.

The Planning Inspectorate will decide whether the application meets the required standards to proceed to examination. This must include their determination of whether our consultation has complied with the contents of this SoCC.

Your data, your rights

On 25 May 2018, the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) became law. The law requires Highways England to explain to you – consultees, stakeholders and customers – how your personal data will be used and stored.

Highways England adheres to the government's consultation principles, the Planning Act 2008 and the Highways Act 1980 as required, and may collect personal data to help shape development of highways schemes.

Personal data collected by the project team will be processed and retained by

Highways England and its appointed contractors until the scheme is complete. In some instances consultation responses may also be sent to the Planning Inspectorate.

Under the GDPR regulations you have the following rights:

- Right of access to the data (Subject Access Request)
- Right for the rectification of errors
- Right to erasure of personal data this is not an absolute right under the legislation
- Right to restrict processing or to object to processing

■ Right to data portability

If, at any point, Highways England plans to process the personal data we hold for a purpose other than that for which it was originally collected, we will tell you what that other purpose is. We will do this prior to any further processing taking place and we will include any relevant additional information, including your right to object to that further processing.

You have the right to lodge a complaint with the supervisory authority, the Information Commissioners Office.
